In last week's bulletin, I outlined some proposed changes to our Mass schedule, which would take effect this July. The principal changes, at least as far as the weekends are concerned, are a movement from four to three Masses on Sunday mornings, and the transfer of the Mass in Spanish to Saturday evenings. As promised, here are the factors we have to take into consideration:

1. For quite some time, there has been serious discussion at the diocesan level about *mandating* every parish to adjust its Mass schedule, in light of actual attendance, seating capacity of the parish's church, staffing levels, etc. While Cardinal Dolan has stopped just short of that, the reality is that parishes that haven't taken a hard look at their schedules are now under tremendous pressure to do so.

2. We currently have the services of three full-time priests. But the day is going to come – probably sooner rather than later – where St. John's will have no more than two full-time priests. We'll certainly always need assistance with the nursing homes and the county jail, but that alone doesn't warrant the level of staffing we have now. The painful truth is this: there simply are not enough priests to go around. Then, too, we're very blessed to have the great assistance of Fr. Komonchak each weekend, but we can't bank on always having a retired priest nearby who is able and willing to help us.

3. One of the decisions to come out of the *Making All Things New* process is that St. John's should collaborate with St. Joseph's in Middletown in the area of Hispanic ministry. I've had several conversations with Fr. Dennis Nikolic, the pastor of St. Joseph's, especially about Mass schedules. Their Sunday Mass in Spanish, which is celebrated at the same time as ours now, draws several hundred people; we have nowhere near that attendance. Thus, we believe that offering one Mass in Spanish on Saturday and one on Sunday is of greater service to Spanish-speaking Catholics in central Orange County. I am very much aware that this would be a significant change for our Spanish-speaking parishioners, and a hardship for some, but we need to look at this within the wider context of how the Church can best serve *all* of our Spanish-speaking population, not just in Goshen.

4. I am gravely concerned about the number of students in our religious education program who are not regularly at Sunday Mass. No doubt, this is partly due to the fact that, as it currently stands, students in Kindergarten through grade 2 are in class during either the 7:30am or 10:30am Masses. As a result, those families are more or less restricted to the 9:00am Mass. By spacing Masses farther apart, that will give families *two* options for Mass, rather than one. It will also allow the priests to be more consistently present in the school during those class sessions, which is simply

impossible right now. By way of illustration: if the Mass schedule were 8:00am, 10:00am, and 12:00pm, classes would be scheduled in between (9:00 to 9:50am and 11:00 to 11:50am). Thus, families whose children are in the first session could attend the 8:00 or 10:00am Masses; those in the second could attend the 10:00am or 12:00pm Masses.

5. The formula proposed by the diocese is that each parish celebrate no more Masses than necessary with a church at 60% capacity. Our church seats approximately 450 people; 60% of that is 270. Given that our weekend attendance is slightly fewer than 1,200 faithful, if we were to follow the diocesan guideline, we should have no more than five Masses (4.44, to be precise). Thus, a reduction from seven to six Masses is not overly drastic. Truth be told, many diocesan officials and other priests I've consulted have strongly suggested that we go from seven to five. While circumstances in the future may force us to reexamine the issue, I believe that what we're proposing is the reasonable course of action for now.

6. When we went through a similar process in my previous parish (going from four to three weekend Masses), an unanticipated but welcome development was that many parishioners discovered neighbors, coworkers, etc., whom they never knew to be Catholic, because they'd always gone to different Masses. So new bonds were forged, and a new sense of community developed. I pray that the same comes from this.

7. In the back of my mind is the potential emergency situation (relatively unlikely, but still entirely possible) of one priest having to celebrate all the Masses on a given weekend. In such a case, two Masses on Saturday evening and four on Sunday is much more manageable than one on Saturday and five on Sunday.

8. I have not touched upon the weekday schedule, which also requires scrutiny. In the near future, we will be consulting and exploring options with those who faithfully attend daily Mass.

I hope this explanation clarifies why we need to take this step. As I wrote last week, this is not something I propose lightly, nor will everyone be pleased with the end result. My primary responsibility, though, is to see that the sacraments are readily available, and that they are celebrated worthily and well (both God and you deserve as much!). We do what we can with what we have, keeping in mind – as governments, school districts, and businesses know all too well – that prudence demands a proactive approach.

BIBLE BASICS 9: PREPARATION FOR THE EXODUS

If the Book of Genesis explains the origins of humanity and of Israel in particular, the Book of Exodus shows why Israel is set apart among humanity. Genesis centers on the covenant with Abraham and his promise of descendants. Exodus centers on the covenant with Moses and his promise of land. Both covenants are ratified by ritual sacrifice and both have a physical sign: the circumcision with Abraham and the stone tablets of the law with Moses. With the Book of Exodus, history becomes more proximate and its telling more precise.

Abraham is a wanderer, and under Moses, the Israelites become wanderers again. Exodus 1–12 tell of the preparations for their journey, their flight from Egypt. We know from the story of Joseph how the Israelites come

to settle in Egypt. In Exodus 1, we hear that they have been enslaved. In Exodus 2, we hear of the birth of Moses, his youthful killing of an Egyptian taskmaster, and his flight into Midian, where he marries Jethro's daughter Zipporah. These first chapters are a brief biographical sweep.

At this point, God becomes the principal actor in the narrative. In Exodus 3, God calls Moses. He draws him to himself through a miraculous sign, the burning bush. He reveals his name, Lord, to him. He also reveals that he will work wonders against the Egyptians. In Exodus 4, God responds to Moses' sense of inadequacy by giving him the power to work two signs to show his authenticity, and by giving him Aaron his brother to speak for him. Also in Exodus 4 do we hear the curious story of the Lord threatening to kill Moses for not yet being circumcised – Zipporah saves him.

Moses and Aaron then make their case before Pharaoh. This makes things worse for the Israelites before it makes them better (Ex 5). Moses shows ten plagues, nine of which seem to make little impression on the king (Ex 6-10). It is only when God strikes at Pharaoh's heart by killing his firstborn, and the firstborn son of all the Egyptians, that he lets the Israelites go. This is the event of Passover, described in Exodus 11–12. The Israelites are protected from the angel of death by sprinkling the blood of a lamb on their doorposts and lintels.

The Passover prefigures Christ. He is the lamb, the firstborn son slain to release humanity from slavery to sin. By sharing in his Precious Blood, we are saved from death.
